Our Welcome Speakers

Dr. Robert Lapidus, Fitchburg State University's 11th President, is a recognized leader in higher education, took office as the 11th president of Fitchburg State University in July 2015. A product of public education, he has long been an advocate for increased access and affordability for higher education. Since becoming president, he has been guiding the university by advancing teaching and learning excellence, fostering diversity and inclusiveness, and engaging the campus community as a steward of place within the city and region.

During his tenure he has invested in student success through the adoption of a revised general education curriculum that includes a first-year experience, designed to help establish students' sense of campus community and strengthen their connection to both their discipline and the institution. Students are introduced to campus resources, practice time management, strengthen study skills, begin to consider career planning, and formulate a better understanding of cultural diversity, among other topics.

Dr. Lapidus also oversaw the adoption of a new five-year strategic plan that focuses on education justice, being a student-ready campus, and inclusive excellence. He also guided the university through the successful completion of an exhaustive accreditation review by the New England Commission of Higher Education.

He is active in the community and volunteers his time in support of a variety of civic leadership organizations. He serves on the boards of several local institutions, including Cushing Academy, the Fitchburg Art Museum, the North Central Massachusetts Chamber of Commerce, and Sizer School. He is an active member of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities, and in April 2022, he was appointed to the NCAA Division III Presidents Council. He was named one of the Worcester Business Journal's "Power 50" in 2022 for his work in community development.

Prior to his arrival at Fitchburg State, he served as the dean of the College of Business Administration at California State Polytechnic University, Pomona. During his time at the college, Lapidus implemented a new strategic plan and guided the college successfully through two Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business re-accreditation processes; a distinction earned by less than 5 percent of business schools worldwide. He provided direction and oversight in the construction of a LEED Silver certified \$42 million College of Business complex and raised more than \$24 million dollars in support of a wide range of college initiatives.

Lapidus earned a bachelor's degree from Indiana University, Bloomington, a master's degree in marketing from California State University, Long Beach, and a doctoral degree in marketing from the University of Nebraska, Lincoln. He also holds a certificate in management and leadership in education from the Harvard Graduate School of Education.

Lapidus and his wife, Lisa, live in Fitchburg. They have two children, Zachary, and Hannah.

Dr. Regina Robinson, Ed.D. joined DESE in September 2021 as a deputy commissioner overseeing strategic initiatives (workforce diversification), educational options (Early College, Charter Schools, etc.), planning and research (policy and federal grants), and the P20W Hub. Regina is a collaborative and skilled leader with a passionate expertise in student success for over 20 years. Prior to joining DESE, Regina was Dean of Student Affairs at Cambridge College, where she provided comprehensive support services to help non-traditional learners complete their degree.

As a promoter of student effectiveness and support, Regina understands students' pathway from admittance to degree conferral, pre-K to career, and engages both higher education and preK-12 stakeholders on the critical components impacting student success. She has been a fierce advocate for K-12 students with disabilities in the Greater Boston area and in 2014 was appointed to serve on the Boston Public Schools' Superintendent Search Committee and was later appointed to the Boston Public School Committee, where she served for one term.

Since 2008, Regina's vast service to organizations has ranged from board and community engagement with past and current organizations like the Massachusetts Early Intervention Consortium, Thrive in Five, Operation House Call, Scholar Athletes, the Higher Education Resource Center, Special Olympics Massachusetts, and the Federation for Children with Special Needs. She has also been a Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Belonging (DEIB) guest lecturer at 10 colleges and universities across the Commonwealth, which include HGSE, BU, UMASS Boston, HMS, and Brown, especially focused on topics of disability inclusion, advocacy, and parental engagement. Regina possesses the unique ability to visualize educational attainment through many lenses: as a former college administrator, instructor, and local district leader to current K-12 parent advocate and statewide policymaker. As the parent of 4 children, one who is a star with Down syndrome, Regina is personally invested in access to education and career success for all students, from all backgrounds, and with all abilities. A recent doctoral graduate in Higher Education Leadership from Regis College, Regina's research is focused on spotlighting gender, race, and executive leadership in education.

Keynote

CJ Powell, *Director of Advocacy, National Association for College Admission Counseling*. CJ Powell currently serves as the Director of Advocacy at the National Association for College Admissions Counseling where he leads the advocacy efforts for the association's 26,000 plus membership on the state and federal level on all issues related to college access. Most recently he served as a Biden-Harris appointee at the U.S. Department of Education beginning as a special assistant to the Assistant Secretary for Postsecondary Education before his promotion to the Chief of Staff role in the same office. While at the Department, CJ worked on a wide range of topics including the Higher Education Emergency Relief Funds, student basic needs, college access programs, college completion programs, and affirmative action. Prior to his federal service, CJ served as the inaugural higher education program analyst at The Leadership Conference on Civil and Human Rights and The Leadership Conference Education Fund. In this role, he led the higher education civil rights coalition, a table of more than 50 national civil rights and policy organizations and led the development of the first full higher education policy agenda from the civil rights community. CJ began his career in education equity as a college adviser in the College Advising Corps, assisting students in rural North Carolina in planning their postsecondary lives. Following graduate school, CJ served as the founding director of college preparation for a new high school in Nashville, Tennessee.

CJ holds a BA in religious studies from University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and an MS Ed. in higher education from the University of Pennsylvania.

Dr. Kyle Hartung is an associate vice president in Jobs for the Future's (JFF) Education Practice. Over the last 25 years Kyle has worked as a teacher, leader, consultant, and researcher in public K–12 systems and higher-education settings. In his current role at JFF he leads teams working with state, regional, and local leaders to design, strengthen, and scale solutions to reimagine the ways in which people—youth, young adults, and adults—experience and move through education and workforce development systems to ensure that they access the knowledge, skills, credentials, and capital critical to launch, re-enter, or advance in a career, achieve

economic advancement, and realize their best possible futures. Kyle is regular participant in our country's ongoing conversation and work about equity, education, workforce development, and the future of work. His areas of expertise include college and career readiness, education-industry partnerships, work-based learning, secondary and postsecondary alignment, intermediary design and development, career navigation, systems change, adult learning, and mixed-methods research.

Dr. Nicole Johnson currently serves as the inaugural Director of Educational Equity and Justice for the Massachusetts Department of Higher Education (DHE). Nicole comes to this work with the aim and passion to challenge the status quo and consider the voices and experiences of historically marginalized students. Through her professional and person endeavors, Nicole seeks to learn more about the experiences of minority students and advocate for change to eliminate the challenges and barriers that racially minoritized students face in the public postsecondary education system. She holds a Bachelor of Science in Management from Bentley University, a Master of Art in Peace and Conflict Students from University of Massachusetts Lowell, and a Doctor of Education in Higher Education Administration from Northeastern University.

Diane Soboski recently joined the Portsmouth Abbey Community as the Director of College Counseling after serving as the Director of Admissions at Champlain College in Burlington, Vermont, since 2018. She began her career in college admissions at Wheelock College in Boston. She continued at the College of the Holy Cross, where she held various admissions roles, each with increased responsibilities, over ten years. While at Champlain College, Soboski oversaw a team of admissions professionals responsible for more than six thousand applications within an increasingly competitive selection process. Her ability to collaborate with colleagues and others involved with financial aid, scholarship, and student success was instrumental in supporting institutional goals and those of prospective students and families. Her work at the College of the Holy Cross included supporting international students and student-athletes, and she was the admissions liaison to both the men's and women's tennis and track and field teams.

Ms. Soboski has also served in several leadership positions within the New England Association of College Admissions Counselors (NEACAC), including as the president-elect of the Executive Board, as well as being elected to serve as a representative for the New England Region of the National Association of College Admission Counseling.

She earned her master's degree in higher education administration from the College of William and Mary and her undergraduate degree from Hamilton College, where she remains actively engaged as an alumna.

4. College Access to College Success: Where and What are the Connections? – Successful access to higher education begins with a student's family and continues as they progress, ideally, into a "college-going"

culture" that includes steady academic progress, good advising and counseling, careful exploration of higher education choices, perhaps dual enrollment, ideally a bridge program, and help securing financial aid -- continuing over the summer when many underrepresented and first generation students need help with their "college prep" homework, including paying required fees.

Once enrolled, ideally, access to 'high impact retention practices":

- 1) "Intrusive advising" that occurs during their first semester, perhaps via a peer mentor
- 2) First Year Experience course, and follow-up
- 3) Guided Pathways narrowing choices to minimize confusion and connect to career exploration
- 4) Learning communities an academic peer group
- 5) Affinity groups discovering shared interests

For "adult learners," older adults transferring, returning to college, or starting for the first time, including vets, advising and counseling geared to their needs.

David Johnston is a planner, researcher and consultant in the life skills learning and education of challenged youth, now working under the banner of the Center for Higher Education Retention Excellence, dedicated to improving access to and success in higher education for underrepresented, first generation and otherwise challenged students. CHERE conducts small, interactive conferences on key higher education issues related to this mission – more than 30 events since its founding in 2012.

In addition to creating CHERE as a subsidiary of the Hartford Consortium for Higher Education, David taught First Year Introduction for five years at Eastern Connecticut State University, a required 3-credit course for all freshmen. He also worked as the recruiter and counselor for the Intensive College Transition Program in Meriden, Conn. 2013-2019, that helped adult learners and ESL students qualify for credit courses at the nearby community college. He has also been a substitute teacher for 11 years, mostly in middle schools in his very diverse community.

He has a BA in Government from Dartmouth College, an MS in Urban Planning from the University of Wisconsin, and an MBA from Columbia University.

Dr. Chaka Felder-McEntire is a professional development consultant and a 20-year+ education administrator with expertise in leadership, motivation, diversity/equity/inclusion, trauma informed practices, counseling, and college & career readiness. A certified Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion professional, Dr. Felder-McEntire provides training and coaching to the public and private industries who want to "repurpose for success". Dr. McEntire is the owner of Higher Elevations Consulting that provides professional development, coaching, motivational speaking, and fitness consultation. Dr. Felder-McEntire is also the founder of Higher Heights Youth Empowerment Programs, Inc. (www.higherheightsyouth.org) and the Connecticut College Access (www.connecticutgoestocollege.org), organizations that both focus to increase Equal Access and Opportunity for all minority, low-income and first-generation students. To date, the organizations have helped over 10,000 students graduate from high school, enroll into college, and provide them with over \$3 million in scholarships.

5. MyCAP – Driving Student Success: Students need to own their futures. MyCAP engages students in process of self-discovery, leading to identification of careers aligned to personal interests' strengths and talents, connecting course taking with career and self-interests and mapping it all to an authentic plan for postsecondary success.

Lisa Harney is a Dropout Prevention and Reengagement Specialist at the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education working in the College, Career, and Technical Education unit. Lisa passionately believes in the potential of EVERY student to not just graduate high school but to be successful in college, career, and active civic life. Her priority projects include alternative education, chronic absence, dropout prevention and re-engagement, and implementation of My Career and Academic Plan (MyCAP) – a four-year individual planning tool for ALL students.

Prior to working at the Department Lisa was the director of an alternative high school for pregnant and parenting teens operated under the guidance of the South Shore Educational Collaborative. The success of the program was in the holistic design including on-site day care, postsecondary planning, mental health counseling services, and a rigorous academic program leading to a high school diploma.

Lisa holds a Bachelor of Science degree from Boston College, a Master of Science degree in Business Education from Suffolk University and a Master of Education degree from UMass/Boston.

6. Post-Secondary Pathway in Entrepreneurship – Network for Teaching Entrepreneurship (NFTE) will share how NFTE and others can support students on their post-secondary entrepreneurship pathway. NFTE will share student stories, resources, and recommendations geared towards supporting students who want to start their own business or incorporate the entrepreneurial mindset into their steps to success! Prior to joining NFTE, Adanma served as the Director of Partnerships for City Year, Boston where she led her team as they served over 50 schools across the city. As a mother to a beautiful 8-year-old son, when not working, Adanma enjoys spending time with her family, cooking up delicious meals based off her grandparent's recipes and roots, and serving as a board member and advisor for various community and institutional boards.

Jennifer Green has been overseeing NFTE's entrepreneurship education programming across New England for twelve years. Over her tenure with the organization, Jennifer has supported nearly 100 entrepreneurship educators across middle schools, high schools, and CBO partnerships. Over her time with NFTE, she has helped 10,000 young people tap into - and leverage - their own entrepreneurial mindset. Jennifer is passionate about igniting the entrepreneurial spirit in young people, having her own transformative experience while earning her MBA from Babson College, rated #1 in the world for entrepreneurship for over 20 years. Jennifer lives in Natick, MA with her wife and two young children. When not working, Jennifer enjoys camping, tennis, birding, and coaching her sons' Little League teams.

7. From Highschool to Higher Education: Creating Realistic Transition Plans for Graduating Students – Join us as we explore innovative ways the UMASS System is supporting students as they transition into the Academic rigor of post-secondary education. Through engaging dialogue, we will discuss common

transitional issues and roadblocks that interfere with student's educational planning. Facilitators will highlight academic, social, and systematic supports provided to incoming first-year students aimed at removing systemic challenges and emphasize student ownership of the academic planning process. Participants will learn about cost effective interventions being utilized in collaboration with SSS programs on campus to scaffold students into credit bearing courses during the summer to limit the financial burden of developmental course enrollments and decrease student's timeline for earning their degree of choice. An emphasis on student reflection and resource management will remain a core component of the dialogue.

Craig Elkins received his B.S. degree in Biology from Plymouth State University and his M.Ed. in Leadership and Management from Fitchburg State University. For over decade, Craig has been working to help underrepresented youth from North Central Massachusetts and the South Coast achieve their educational goals through positions in local school districts as well as state and federal grants within Mount Wachusett Community College and here at UMASS Dartmouth. 8. More Than Just Milestones: A Culturally Relevant Approach to Postsecondary Planning in an Inequitable World –

Postsecondary planning is often thought of as a series of steps like building a list of schools or programs, writing a personal statement, completing FAFSA, and submitting applications. OneGoal's approach, which is grounded in Culturally Relevant Pedagogy, ties these steps to the process of identity exploration and fostering a critical consciousness to support students in understanding the systemic barriers to postsecondary success and persisting towards their greatest aspirations. Based on internal research OneGoal conducted of alumni who did not complete a degree, our approach is designed to prepare students to successfully navigate the challenges they may face in their transition to postsecondary without internalizing systemic failures as their own. This workshop will feature an overview of OneGoal's research and how that influenced an overhaul in our curriculum as well as a panel of students who will share reflections on their experience through the transition to postsecondary.

Growth in these competencies sets up the framework to future success in developing a college access mindset in your staff.

14. Advising Low-income Students into Postsecondary Programs that Lead to Well-Paying Careers

Low-income students are investing thousands of dollars and hours on a college education, yet for too
many of them, it isn't paying off. The lack of clearly marked paths to well-paying careers is contributing
to the erosion of faith in the value of a postsecondary education and a decline in college enrollment,
particularly for students of color and those who are seeking an alternative to the traditional four-year
degree. High school and college advisors -- and their students -- need more information to understand
their local labor market and to identify a variety of postsecondary programs that lead to financially
rewarding careers. NextGen Talent will present its framework and tools for making advising more
career-focused and evidence-based, which include labor market literacy tools and a high-value
postsecondary program finder. We cannot equitably counsel all students or narrow the racial wealth
gap without a new approach to advising.
